Being Anti-Racist: Our Call to Stand with Our Brothers & Sisters

Liz, a white woman, was running through her neighborhood pushing the stroller with her adopted child, who is black. A man was coming the other way walking his dog. Just as he passed her, he blurted out, "This isn't Africa."


This is just one of many stories relayed to me in several interviews on the issue of racism. So why is racism the subject of a column devoted to Pro-Life issues? In their 2018 Pastoral Letter, Open Wide Our Hearts, the US Bishops wrote, "As bishops, we unequivocally state that racism is a life issue." More recently, Archbishop Schnurr stated, "Opposing racism must... be an integral part of our pro-life witness as Catholics." Racism is an issue related to the dignity of human life, and that makes it a pro-life issue.

This month's interviews feature several people, black and white, including white parents who have adopted black children. Some of their stories show that racism can still be quite blatant. Caroline is a white woman whose neighbor stopped letting her grandchild play in her yard after she adopted a black child, not wanting her to associate with "that n**** boy." But more often, racism is subtle, like presuming a

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black person in the workplace must be the janitor or showing great surprise that a black person could write a good report. If you don't believe racism still exists, you need to hear these stories. And while our natural response might be, "I'm sorry that happened to you," we need to do more.

As Esperanza from our Racism Task Force said, "Maybe God wants you to work on racism in healthcare. Maybe God wants you to work on racism in education. Pray on it and see where God might lead you." In other words, we cannot be indifferent. We need to stand with our



Perhaps it would have been in a different

time and place. Today, however, it is easily heard as ignoring the reality of what our black neighbors have endured throughout the history of this country. Debbie, a leader in the pro-life movement in our Archdiocese says that such a response "just disregards everything the person was saying before that." Liz, who I mentioned

at the beginning of this article, put it this way, "If my child comes to me with a scraped knee and says, 'Mommy, I'm hurting!' and my response to her is, 'Everyone hurts sometimes,' that's true, but it would be a cruel and hurtful response." So when the black community tells us, "We are

This document encourages individuals, families, parishes, and the Church at large to work towards welcoming persons with disabilities into full participation in our ecclesial communities and to advocate for the needs of persons with disabilities in the secular realm.

Vaccination as Catholics By: Kara Ross

This month is national vaccine awareness month! While usually this awareness month is probably only celebrated by pharmaceutical reps, our current public health crisis has made vaccines a hot issue as we all continue to socially distance and mask-up. All of us want to see an end to the COVID19 pandemic and many hope that a vaccine will be just that. However, as Catholics, there are a few moral ideas we should consider.

First, we are called to use morally-sourced vaccines when these are available. This means that if a vaccine was developed using cells lines derived from aborted fetal tissue, we must do our research to find out if there is another vaccine available that has been developed from an alternative

source. Sometimes, as in the case of chicken pox, there is no alternative and parents must make the best choice for their child's health. **CLICK HERE** to see the USCCB's statement.

As a COVID19 vaccine is being worked on, we have a unique opportunity to stand for life in terms of how medical research is conducted. We can demand that health care companies use cell lines from sources other than abortions to create and test a new vaccine. To be a voice for this change, you simply have to call or write your senator or representative. Tell them to vote now for a law that would restrict big pharmacy in how they can create a new vaccine. A moral choice is not a slower choice, it simply means that all people will use the new vaccine rather than risking some not using it due to moral concerns.

Fetal Tissue Cell Lines

It is important to note that the tissue used in vaccines does not come from recently aborted babies. The practice of harvesting fetal tissue has been outlawed for years. The tissue in question comes from the growth of a cell line that was developed in the 1960's from two different fetuses. While many vaccine makers no longer use these cells, there are a few that are still utilizing cells that were developed from fetal tissue.

Ultrasound Blessings

On Memorial Day weekend 2019, the St. Margaret of York Respect Life ministry partnered with our Knights of Columbus council to begin an Ultrasound Initiative. We were not sure if the message would be well received or if the funding we sought would come in. We prayed that the SMOY parishioners would see the need for an ultrasound machine at ENLC and assist mothers in crisis pregnancy. Not only did parishioners respond, but they did so quickly and within two weeks we had funding to not only fund the



machine for ENLC Women's Center in Lebanon, we had money to spare and began the process of looking for another pregnancy center to assist. In December, we received word that the Family Life Center of Auglaize County in Wapakoneta, OH was looking for an ultrasound machine for their new center. SMOY was once again able to provide the funding needed along with the Knights of Columbus match to purchase this life saving equipment in their center. On July 25th, Fr. Jason Bedel was able to bless FLCAC's ultrasound machine and pray for the women who would come to the center seeking assistance! We pray that through our efforts and the generosity of the SMOY parishioners, hearts will be changed and lives will be saved for
