Below are five more resources for you to consider for addressing racism, bias, and equity.

<u>Echoes of Racism: Whispers of Healing</u>, Virtual Learning Community for Faith Formation (VLCFF), University of Dayton, 3 Week E-Seminar; <u>VLCFF @ UD > Home (udayton.edu)</u>

Course Summary: Racism has plagued most countries for centuries. This seminar is an attempt to understand what Catholic Christians are called to do in the face of racism. In Genesis 1: 26, scripture tells us we are made in the image and likeness of God. If so, then human beings must endeavor to see the image of God in all persons whom they encounter. This seminar will address socio-cultural underpinnings of racism, and then, discuss possible solutions from a faith perspective.

<u>General Course Objectives:</u> To understand the roots of racism; to evaluate philosophical and political underpinnings; to deliberate on sustainable ways to effectively discuss racism; to create viable (Christian) solutions which can replace toxic situations.

From the Local to the Global: How the 19th Century Built a Worldwide Catholic Faith by Dr. John McGreevy

Dr. John McGreevy, author, American historian and the Francis A. McAnaey Professor of History at the University of Notre Dame, will speak on February 24 at 7:30 pm at Mount St. Mary's Seminary & School of Theology (MTSM). Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, this lecture will be conducted virtually and will be available via www.athenaeum.edu/live.

Dr. McGreevy's lecture, "From the Local to the Global: How the 19th Century Built a Worldwide Catholic Faith," will focus on the growth of Catholicism in the 1800s. Part of the growth began in Cincinnati as new patterns of how Catholics understood their church and the world around them became more evident. Drawing on the research for his upcoming book, *Catholicism:* A Global History from the French Revolution to Pope Francis, Dr. McGreevy will connect local events to the wider Catholic world.

Dr. McGreevy joined the University of Notre Dame's faculty in 1997. He served as Chair of the Department of History from 2002–2008 and Dean of the College of Arts and Letters from 2008–2018. He is the author of three books: *Parish Boundaries: The Catholic Encounter with Race in the 20th Century Urban North, Catholicism and American Freedom: A History* and *American Jesuits and the World: How an Embattled Religious Order Made Modern Catholicism Global.* He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Notre Dame and his Doctor of Philosophy degree from Stanford University.
