Grant Reporting EANS EdChoice

GRANT REPORTING

The Coronavirus grants will require reporting (CRF, BroadBand, EANS)

Schools agreed to reporting requirements when accepting the 'assurances' of the grant

Reporting is done quarterly, typically Jan-Mar, April-June, July-September, October-December

Who must complete grant reporting? (Use unique code included with reporting email)

- Any school that has accepted the money
- Includes any school that has already been reimbursed some/all of the CRF grant funds
- Includes any school that is still working on DUNS/SAM, but has not yet received funds

What must be reported?

- Report any funds 'used' during current period include amounts and categories enter zeroes in columns if you did not use any funds during current period
- If you have not yet set up funding or have already used all the funds, then enter zeroes



EANS UPDATE - MARCH 26, 2021

Final Allocations expected in early April – we are 'on hold' awaiting contact from ESCs

US Department of Education provided <u>Updated FAQ</u> on March 19

Updated FAQ contains changes from previous guidance (section D – beginning page 16)

- Clarifies cleaning supplies are eligible but NOT cleaning services
- Clarifies that preschools connected to a nonpublic school are eligible for EANS
- Clarifies use of EANS for staffing cannot be used for normal teacher payroll must be a
 part of targeted and specific program to address learning loss will require some type of
 contract over and above the teacher-minister contract clearly must be secular role
 An SEA may provide services or assistance directly to non-public schools or it may contract with an individual,
 association, agency (e.g., an LEA), or organization (3rd party vendor) to provide such services or assistance.



EANS UPDATE - MARCH 26, 2021

SB 89 passed 2020

Expansion language increases eligibility to 250% of poverty level – increases number of available Expansion scholarships

Traditional language caused some confusion and surprise – SB 89 focused on list of eligible public schools – initial guidance released on March 2 – excluded nonpublic students from first time eligibility of traditional scholarships – revised guidance released on March 19 includes revision to include section five from SB 89 – first time Traditional eligibility for current nonpublic students under specific conditions, including limited sibling provision – high school 'bridge' language removed allowing 9th graders first time eligibility to for high school
