

Homecoming

With the pandemic continuing to wane and availability of boosters for adults and vaccinations for children 5-11, we hope to see more and more people making their way back to worship in person.

Here are some strategies for parish leaders to help welcome everyone back to church for Christmas and in the New Year:

- **Be as hospitable and welcoming as you can be.** Greet those returning after a long absence with warmth and sincerity, without questioning their motives or timing.
 - Work with ushers, greeters, parish staff, and anyone else who greets parishioners in person so they present a welcoming face.
 - Make sure your website and all public communication conveys warmth and welcome.
- Ensure that Mass times, office hours, and other important information is accurate online, in email communications, and everywhere people may look. It's possible that Mass times have changed since last they came to Mass in the church building.
- If you suspended **Children's Liturgy of the Word** due to Covid-19, consider restoring it for one or more Sunday Masses. Communicate this broadly, inviting families with young children to join.
- Post a **video message from the pastor**, before or after the livestreams of Sunday liturgies, inviting people back to in-person worship (or at least an image).
 - Resist any urge to diminish the value of participation via livestreaming. Virtual participation has been important to many people during the pandemic and should be seen as a step towards physical participation. Livestreaming will remain a valuable pastoral tool for the sick, those unable to be in town for weddings and funerals, etc.
- Utilize the resources of the **TOGETHER** initiative in your catechesis, preaching, communication, faith formation, and other parish efforts to help parishioners understand the importance of inperson worship, the centrality of the Eucharist in our lives, the importance of Sunday, and other important topics.
