Caring for our common home with clean solar energy

Over many years, the Sisters of the Precious Blood have taken actions to help protect our environment where and when we can. We have been recycling, changing out our light bulbs to LEDs, and adjusting our thermostats either lower or higher to reduce our fossil fuel consumption. In our most recent Assemblies, there were Directives encouraging the Congregation to take more steps to support the environment and reduce our "carbon footprint." In 2015, our congregational leadership decided that it was time to explore solar energy production with our properties in Dayton.

Since this was a new effort, it was decided to start small by putting solar panels on two of the buildings. Orchard House (a residence) and the Congregational Administrative Offices were chosen. After some research, a company was chosen, and work began. Leadership was pleased with the installation and, later, the results of the panels on the two buildings, so the decision was made to build a solar array to supply electricity to Salem Heights, our central house in Dayton. Work began in 2019. The array was built on land that had once been an orchard — but most of the trees had long been replaced, so there was an open space to build the array. In all, 1,696 panels were installed.

The array became operational in July 2020. The system can produce 557.57 kWh on sunny days, somewhat less on cloudy days. This translates to supplying about 60% of the electrical needs of Salem Heights. It also means that we have saved about 1,180 barrels of fossil fuels and reduced about 1,500 tons of CO2.

When a new garage was built at the Farm House (another residence), it was designed to hold solar panels; in 2022, solar panels were installed on the roof of the residence in Redlands, California. As Sisters of the Precious Blood, it is in our DNA — or, if you will, "our blood" — to care for God's creation where and when we can.

LS 220:

The ecological conversion needed to bring about lasting change is also a community conversion. This conversion calls for a number of attitudes which together foster a spirit of generous care, full of tenderness. First, it entails gratitude and gratuitousness, a recognition that the world is God's loving gift, and that we are called quietly to imitate his generosity in self-sacrifice and good works: "Do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing... and your Father who sees in secret will reward you" (Mt 6:3-4). It also entails a loving awareness that we are not disconnected from the rest of creatures, but joined in a splendid universal communion.

Theme - Concerns/Challenges (30-45 minutes) - St. Paul's Garden

Story/Speaker

God's Garden of Eatin' at St. Paul's parish, was originally founded in 1992 under the direction of Sue Sack and a committee formed to assist in this ministry. Sue had been volunteering at the CSSMV food pantry for a while already, and donating her excess chicken eggs there, so she already knew that the opportunity for good, fresh food was almost non-existent for a certain segment of the local population. As the early garden committee realized, those who are watching their food budget can only sparingly afford fresh produce or fruit – what better way to help our neighbors in need than to provide this for them by the work of our own hands? Why, they asked, shouldn't this become a productive garden that could grow fresh produce for those who were in need and used the local food pantries? They saw the potential for this in the 12 acres of grass surrounding the parish church.

The three tasks the committee set before themselves were 1. To produce good, organic produce for their neighbors in need; 2. To operate as a working spiritual community interested in environmental justice; and 3. As an education point for children/adults interested in learning some important life skills. Those goals remain the same today.

God's Garden operated continuously for 16 years, then was resurrected on the parish grounds in 2007 as a tri-parish effort of the Catholic Communities of Northwest Dayton. Not only is an abundance of produce grown, but the garden also acts as a drop-off point for other local gardeners who wish to donate the excess from their gardens. Today the garden is over 8000 sq feet, and over the years those involved have donated close to 20 tons of organic produce to a half-dozen local organizations. It has also spawned a half-dozen other, smaller gardens through the years.

By early-May an initial planting date is set, and all those interested are invited to come help set out cabbage, broccoli, and tomatoes, and to plant beds of beans, cucumbers and squash, lettuce, and other vegetables. The garden is self-funded by volunteers and private donors – St. Paul's provides the land and water from an otherwise unused well.

During the summer volunteers gather at the garden generally twice a week to continue to plant, weed, mulch and harvest. Additionally, every month visitors are specifically invited to a special event of some kind at the garden – generally involving good food! All produce gathered is given to grateful. local food pantries. Usually we continue to meet at least weekly through the first frost at the beginning of October.

Questions (3-5 minutes)

1 Corinthians 12:18-26

[...] God placed the parts, each one of them, in the body as he intended. If they were all one part, where would the body be? But as it is, there are many parts, yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, "I do not need you," nor again the head to the feet, "I do not need you." Indeed, the parts of the body that seem to be weaker are all the more necessary, and those parts of the body that we consider less honorable we surround with greater honor, and our less presentable parts are treated with greater propriety, whereas our more presentable parts do not need this.
